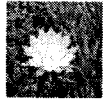
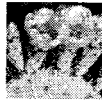

CACSS Library News, June 2003

NEW BOOKS:

- *A Cactus Odyssey, Journeys in the Wilds of Bolivia, Peru, and Argentina* by James D. Mauseth, Roberto Kiesling, and Carlos Ostolaza. Timber Press; (March 2002). Hardcover: 306 pages. This book presents the stories of three avid field biologists who over the course of 15 years frequently traveled together in search of cacti in Bolivia, Peru, and Argentina. The conversational style of this travelogue allows us to share in the authors' excitement as they encounter plants that have rarely, if ever, been written about. Nearly 195 remarkable color photographs accompany the vivid descriptions of unusual cacti growing alongside non-succulent plants, at altitudes of 8000 feet or more and even in rain-forests! A Cactus Odyssey will interest gardeners, travelers, and conservationists from around the world who wish to learn more about these irresistible plants, and it is the hope of the authors that this book will inspire others to undertake their own cactus odyssey.
- *Cacti and Succulents in Habitat* by Ken Preston-Matham. Cassell Academic; (August 1994). Hardcover: 159 pages. Presents photographs of the author's discoveries of around 100 cacti and succulents in their natural habitats in South America, South Africa and South Western USA. Travellers and gardeners alike can learn where the plants can be found and how they can be grown in natural conditions.
- *The Banksia Book* by Alex S. George. Kangaroo Press Pty Ltd; (2nd Edition 1987). Hardcover: 240 pages. This recently donated book describes Banksias which are part of the protea family. Banksias are woody evergreen plants named after Joseph Banks who collected the first specimens in 1770. They are among the best known Australian wildflowers. This is the first book to describe and give comprehensive coverage of all known seventy-five species. It includes fourteen species and eleven varieties named since 1981. The second edition includes two new species and two new varieties. The author describes each species, where it grows, when it flowers, how and when it was discovered and named. There are over 200 colored plates showing flowers, buds, fruit and habit, and drawings of fruit and seeds of all species. Advice is given on how to grow them. The introduction gives a history of their discovery, describes what makes a plant a Banksia, tells how to collect seed, and raise plants in the garden. There are tables to assist choosing Banksias for different situations. Jo writes, "I believe Paul Chambers of Australian Native Landscapes has grown Banksia ericifolia over in Phoenix for several years. I have two desert forms of Banksia that may work well in Phoenix, Banksia elderiana and B. marginata (I think I have a few here) desert form. Banksia prinotes and B. victoriae and B. ashbyi (if I have any ready) might also be worth trying. If you are interested to give B. ericifolia a try I also have B. Giant Candles' a hybrid between B. ericifolia x B. spinulosa".
